

In those times when we're honest with ourselves we will acknowledge that while we have a desire to do things for God, we would rather the things we do not be too much of an inconvenience or a challenge. If we can sing, then God asking us through an inner prompting to deliver the sermonic selection may not be that tall of an order. If we can't sing? Well, that's another story altogether! If we have \$300, a divine request to give \$50 to the visiting evangelist is one thing. But if we have only \$55 to get us through the rest of the week? Well...

In all of our doing, God doesn't simply look at the act, He's also looking at what it has cost us. If what we purpose to do for God is to be accepted, it must cost us something. That's because the cost we're willing to pay reflects just how worthy God is in our eyes.

David understood this deeply. As we know, the Bible tells us that David was a man after God's own heart (1 Samuel 13:14; Acts 13:22). This does not mean that David was perfect, by any means. He committed many sins, but when he did, he recognized his sins and

confessed them without excuse. David also knew the importance of making a sacrifice for God.

For example, when David sinned by conducting a census (an act that revealed David's pride and faith in the size of his army) God sent a plague upon Israel that killed 70,000 people (2 Samuel 24:1-15). David confessed his sin before the Lord and was instructed by the prophet Gad to build an altar to the Lord on the threshing floor of Araunah (vv. 17-18). When King David told Araunah that he had come to buy his threshing floor to build an altar to God, Araunah immediately offered to give David everything - the threshing floor, the oxen for the sacrifice and wood for the fire (vv.

David immediately replied, "No, I insist on buying it, for I will not present burnt offerings to the Lord my God that have cost me nothing" (v. 24a NLT). David promptly paid Araunah 50 pieces of silver for the threshing floor and the oxen. He then built the altar, sacrificed burnt offerings and peace offering unto the Lord, and the plague was stopped (vv. 24b-25).

It is not enough that we make sacrifices for God - sacrifices of time, money, choice of activities, etc. what's more important is that our sacrifices must cost us something. That's the only way that they will be meaningful to God. And remember, the cost is not measured in absolutes. Jesus said the widow who placed two mites into the offering plate (about a quarter of a penny), gave more than the rich who had given much more in actual dollars (Mark 12:41-43). How is that? Let the Lord Jesus declare it: "For they all put in out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty put in all that she had, her whole livelihood" (v. 44). The widow's tiny offering really cost her something.

So whatever you "give up" for God, whether it's big or small by the world's standards is not the issue. The only question that matters is what is it costing you? If it's costing you little or nothing, please know it is not a sacrifice worthy of our God. If we keep our heart and mind focused on to Whom it is we are making the sacrifice, we will give out of a heart of love and obedience, and will present to God a sacrifice that is both holy and acceptable.

Pesterday's Anointing

One of the biggest enemies to continued success is past success. Your last presentation went well; everybody loved it. Brimming with confidence, you gave another presentation a few weeks later, and it fell flat. Less than half-way through, you knew it wasn't going well at all. What happened? Well, for the first presentation, you studied and prepared diligently. You also spent time praying, fasting and reading the Word. This time around? Well, you spent more time recalling your past success and picking out what you were going to wear than anything else. In the end, God taught you a hard lesson: today's success requires today's anointing.

The disciples experienced a similar situation. In Mark Chapter 6, Jesus sent them out two-by-two to preach and to heal the sick. Before releasing them He "gave them power over unclean spirits" (Mark 6:7). As a result, the disciples went forward preaching repentance "and they cast out many devils, and anointed with oil many that were sick, and healed them" (v. 13).

After they returned, the disciples continued to walk with Jesus, receiving His teaching and standing as witnesses to many miracles. In the process, they got to know Him better. In Mark Chapter 8, Jesus asked them, "Who say ye that I am?" Peter answered for them all: "Thou art the Christ" (v. 29). The disciples' knowledge had clearly grown and they had now come to know Jesus as Messiah.

However, later on, a distraught father brought his demon-possessed son to the disciples, but they could not cast the demon out (Mark 9:14-18). Jesus took command of the situation and delivered the young man (v.25-27). When the disciples asked Jesus why they could not cast out the demon, Jesus replied: "This kind can come forth by nothing, but by prayer and fasting" (v.28-29).

Prior to this event, the disciples went out and cast out "many devils" (Mark 6:13), but now they could not cast out one. And this was after they learned more about Jesus, saw Him feed a multitude with two fish and five loaves, saw Him walk on water, perform miraculous healings in various places and feed four thousand with seven loaves. If we were to put it in today's terms, the disciples continued to come to church and witnessed divine deliverance every week, but still stood powerless against the lone demon. Why? Because they were living off yesterday's success.

When Jesus told the disciples that the demon who was wreaking havoc in the young boy's life could not come out except by prayer and fasting, He was essentially telling them that to walk in continuing power and to be ready whenever trouble arose, the disciples had to have a lifestyle marked by prevailing prayer and communion with God. A lifestyle like His. That is where the anointing comes from. Jesus didn't pray and fast immediately before casting out the demon. His power to do so was found in His enduring relationship with the Father.

The disciple is not above his master (Luke 6:40). If Jesus had to rely daily on His connection with the Father to walk in power, how much more must we? Yesterday's anointing was sufficient for yesterday's problems. For today, we need a fresh anointing. So don't live off yesterday's laurels. Continue walking with God – through prayer, fasting and meditation on His Word – and let God empower you anew for every challenge and obstacle in your path today!

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Out Popped a Calf!

Moses was on the top of Mount Sinai communing with the Lord when the people got impatient and demanded Aaron make an idol that they would worship as a god (Exodus 31:18-32:1). Aaron told the people to bring him gold, which the Bible says, "he received ... from their hand, and he fashioned it with an engraving tool, and made a molded calf." Not only that, after Aaron saw what he had made, he built an altar before the golden idol (Exodus 32:4-5 NKJV). Yet, when Moses returned to the camp and demanded an explanation for his sinful conduct, Aaron replied that the people gave him gold "and I cast it into the fire, and this calf came out" (v. 24). Instead of taking ownership of his wrongful conduct, Aaron resorted to excuses - "I just threw gold into the fire and out popped a calf!" Sounds ridiculous, until we consider the many times we "explain" why we miss the mark: "God knows my heart." "I'm not there yet." "God made me this way." "It's her fault; she made me so mad." Every time we make excuses like these we sound just like Aaron. Stop making excuses. Your sin does not just "happen." When you mess up, 'fess up; it's the only way to get your cleansing and get right with God (1 John 1:9).
