The King James version of this verse says, "*be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind*." God is not concerned with changing things, His focus is on changing us – His beloved sons and daughters! God wants us to be conformed to the image of His Son, Jesus (Romans 8:29). The Word says, "But we all with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, *are changed into the same image, from glory to glory*, even as by the Spirit of the Lord" (2 Corinthians 3:18).




## The Praper of Babration


